Finding: Mould - Present

Information: Generally, the client is advised to ensure that the general environment is free of

moisture and humidity to aid in the prevention of mould formation and development. Any mould found during the inspection should be cleaned immediately by a cleaning

contractor or the homeowner as applicable.

Finding: ACM visual suspected in Eave Sheet

Information: The area inspected is suspected asbestos-containing materials identified.

Various factors were assessed including the visual presentation of building materials,

construction method and the age of the building to determine this finding.

The material appears to have no obvious signs of damage or deterioration, indicating that the asbestos is currently encapsulated and contained.

The Asbestos visually identified would be considered low risk.

No works should be carried out to the ACM or associated building elements without further specialist advice. Furthermore, areas with suspected ACMs should be avoided by all persons to minimise potential for health safety risk.

A sample for lab analysis to confirm the presence of asbestos should be taken.

Removal by a Licensed Asbestos Removal firm would be recommended.

Location: All External Areas

Finding: Site drainage - suspected Inadequate

Information: The site drainage in this area was found to be inadequate at the time of inspection,

creating potential for subsequent water damage to associated building elements.

It is important that water does not lie against the base of walls; surrounding paths and ground levels should be sloped to drain water away from walls. Downpipes should not disgorge stormwater onto lower walls or plinths. Stormwater should be carried away by large, regularly cleaned drains. Ground levels may need to be lowered to expose a buried DPC.

Where site drainage is inadequate, installation of an Agricultural (Aggie) Drain may be required. A qualified plumber should be appointed to further inspect the property and perform any remedial works as necessary. Water damage and secondary defects are likely to occur if left unmanaged.

Finding: Sealant - missing/ deteriorated

Information: Flexible and mould resistant materials should be applied to affected areas to prevent

any subsequent water damage that is likely to occur. Regular maintenance and replacement of damage or missing or damaged sealant and grout is highly recommended to the wet areas, as this is a regular wear and tear defect.

Sealant and grouting in areas that come into regular contact with water should be maintained for the long term care of your property. A sealant specialist or tiling contractor should be appointed to complete these works as soon as possible

Finding: Cracking - External Concrete Paving Damage Category 1 - Fine (less than 2mm)

Information: Fine cracks were identified in external concrete paving. Although fine cracks are quite

noticeable, they are often only considered to be an appearance defect, and usually do not indicate any structural damage. To be considered a Category 1 or fine crack, the

crack is found to be less than 2mm in width.


Generally the cause of a hairline crack in existing concrete paving such as driveways and pathways is indicative of the expansion and contraction of the concrete. Such causes are generally due to environmental factors, such as moisture levels, weather conditions, root systems of nearby trees or the soil types on which they are laid.

Fine cracks may also be due to poor original installation of the concrete. Factors such as poor compaction of the sub surface and/or inadequate reinforcing of the slab may create cracking and other secondary defects.

Monitoring of all cracking should be conducted frequently. Always contact a building inspector should cracks widen, lengthen, or become more numerous.

Finding: Fencing - Deteriorated

Information: It was noted at the time of inspection that sections of the fencing throughout the

property have deteriorated. Typically fencing deteriorates due to age and or wear, rot and or rust which is generally expected for a structure of this age, due to prolonged exposure to weather conditions. Sometimes inadequate installation or maintenance

can be to blame.


If left unattended, it is likely that further damage will occur. It is suspected that repair of several elements of the fencing may be required however replacement may be a

consideration of the client also.

A licensed fencing contractor should be appointed to provide further advice and perform rectification works as necessary.



Finding: Building element - Rusted or corroded

Information: This building element shows evidence of rusting and corrosion, which is likely to have

developed as a result of excessive exposure to moisture and or inadequate coatings.

Rusting and corrosion should be managed by ideally removing or limiting the affected surface from exposure to moisture. A registered builder may be appointed to replace any building elements that have been severely affected by rust or water damage.

Finding: Cracks to rendered surfaces - Category 1

Information: It has been observed that cracking to rendered surfaces has occurred in this area.

The degree of damage falls within Category 1, described as fine cracks that do not

need repair and which are less than 1.0mm in width limit.

Damage of this category is not considered a defect for rectification. Always contact your builder should cracks widen, lengthen, or become more numerous.

Finding: Timber - exposed to weather

Information: External timbers that are frequently exposed to harsh weather conditions require

adequate protection in order to maintain their condition. Where timbers have not been painted or treated adequately, general deterioration is likely to occur at an accelerated

rate.

If left unattended, replacement of these timbers is likely to be necessary in the short-term future. Adequate treatment of these timbers is required as soon as possible by a painting contractor or general handyman.

Information: These photographs are an indication of the obstructions and limitations which

impeded full inspection of the property at the time of inspection. These obstructions can hide an array of defects and should be removed to allow full inspection to be carried out. A re-inspection is recommended once the areas are made accessible.

Finding: Stored timbers - external area

Information: The storing of timbers around the external property increases the risk of termite

activity being present. As they are likely to come into contact with weather conditions or excessive moisture wood rot is likely to develop on timbers that are not treated.

It is highly recommended that any stored timbers be immediately removed from areas in which they may attract any termite / timber pest attack. Minimisation of risk / prevention of termite attack is far more adequate than dealing with the presence of termite activity.



Finding: Insulation - present

Information: Upon inspection of the roof void it was noted that there is was insulation.

Caution should be exercised when accessing the roof void. Do not attempt to stand on the framework to the underside of the trusses and be aware there is a potential for electric shock if contact is made with exposed or faulty electrical wiring.

Finding: Sarking - installed

Information: Sarking is under the roof sheeting. Sarking acts as an insulator that helps with noise

reduction and protects against water penetration. Sarking plays a key role in the operation and function of the overall roofing structure and its performance.

Finding: Moisture meter readings - low

Information: The moisture meter result for the areas inspected.

The moisture reading of 0-15% is quite normal and gives no cause for concern. However, moisture readings in excess of 15% indicate the need for further inspection.

Levels between 25-30% indicate that there may be water ingress, meaning that remedial work could be required.









Location: Subfloor

Finding: Subfloor - Debris

Information: An array of debris was found in the subfloor area at the time of inspection. Debris in

this area restricts subfloor ventilation and creates potential for concealed pest entry. Stored timbers and other materials may also make the area susceptible to termite

activity and wood rot.

A clear and empty subfloor will be better ventilated and easier to maintain in a dry condition. The removal of any timber debris is vital in minimising the risk of termite or wood borer activity.

Debris in the subfloor should be removed as soon as possible. Depending on the location and amount of debris and stored items, the homeowner may elect to undertake this task. Alternatively there are a large number of rubbish removal subcontractors that could undertake these works.
